- Who purchased the object?
- Who used the object and how?
- Who created the object?
- Where and when was it made?
- What skills or knowledge were required to make or use the object?
- What can the object tell us about the identity of the maker and the owner?

<u>The Getty Museum Art and Architecture Thesaurus</u> – A large database which can help in narrowing down the time period, location, creator, and other identifiers of a piece.

<u>Victoria and Albert Museum Collections</u> Online collections of the museum which can help in narrowing down the time period, location, creator, and other identifiers of a piece.
